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2020-21 will be remembered as a year where nature threw some punches as we celebrated our 21st year. What a moment - 21 years of this community of outstanding artists and radically generous supporters. While this Annual Report summarises the 2020/2021 year, I wanted to mark the sense of aroha, support and connection we've had in our entire 21st vear of The Arts Foundation of New Zealand Te Tumu Toi o Aotearoa. Despite being in and out of lockdowns, this organisation has seen even more backers come out to support New Zealand artists. We've also seen more of our 194 strong alumni of Arts Foundation Icons, Laureates and Springboards perform on our shores through festivals and shows grounded in Aotearoabased talent.

While we're buoyed by awarding 16 new artists into our whānau in 2020/2021, we were saddened to say goodbye to three: 2013 Arts Foundation Laureate Megan Wraight, 2009 Arts Foundation Laureate Richard Nunns, and 2018 Icon Billy Apple.

While there were indeed some very significant challenges for many in the creative sector, our mission of boosting opportunities for artists and amplifying their impact has started to 'hum' and in my fourth year as Chair, I've seen more generosity, media engagement and relationships forged than before. Thank you to the individuals, businesses, regional arts organisations, and iwi (haere mae Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu) that are making this movement of valuing creativity happen. You're literally putting your money and advocacy where your hearts and minds are, and we couldn't be more excited to be building a new era of backing the arts with you and our growing whanau of legendary creatives. Finally, I'd like to take this moment to thank my fellow Trustees for their tireless volunteer mahi. We have a wonderful Board and I feel very privileged to work with all of you.





Donations Revenue for Boosted projects \$1.47m and while down on last year's record year by \$124k (7.8%), still a hugely well above our 2022 target outcome



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Boosted Campaigns

Both Creative New Zealand Toi Aotearoa and Rata Foundation backed month-long campaigns, Boosted x Moana and Boosted x Ōtautahi. Each partner gave match gifts to projects that took place in a particular community – Pasifika artists nationwide, and arts projects in Christchurch Ōtautahi. All projects ran for a dedicated month and all were successful, bringing in funding for both the artists and for Boosted.

New Partnerships

To help us secure funding, we welcomed in four new givers through the year for four major awards:

- Jillian Friedlander gave a ten-year gift of \$30,000 for a Laureate receiving the Te Moana Nui-a-Kiwa Award annually
- Three, three-year gifts of \$25,000 set up three new Springboard Awards from Abby McCormick and Carroll Joynes (for dance), the Leighs Family (for contemporary music) and Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu (to be allocated for 2022 partnership). Philip Carter has also come on recently as a new partner for Springboard.

The Great NZ Arts Dinner Parties

Keeping Covid-19 proof, we turned our NZ Arts Ball into a series of 16 dinner parties around the motu. The concept, which raised \$150,000 for the Arts Foundation through sales and a digital Art+Object auction, saw 16 generous hosts buy a dinner party and then choose an Arts Foundation artist and a chef to join them along with at least 10 guests. New friends, collaborations and stories were shared.

All In For Arts Tour He waka toi eke e noa nei tātou

For the first time, Te Tumu Toi hit the road for a month in Spring – putting on 10 breakfasts in 10 towns, where we heard from 6 locals on the difference creativity can make (along with a visiting Arts Foundation Te Tumu Toi Laureate). We heard new perspectives from a diverse range of New Zealanders: from business owners, to Mayors, to local artists, to rangatahi and mana whenua, all sharing unforgettable stories and evidence that arts matters to New Zealanders.
